

A. 學校簡介

在課內學習中，我受益最多且最喜歡的是「書< (寫作)」課程。這門課絕非單純的文法練習，而是高強度的實戰表達訓練。課堂上我們必須將自己的思維邏輯具體化，從結構鋪陳、論點論證到精準用詞，反覆進行撰寫與修正。在教授與同儕的互評過程中，我不僅跨越了外語寫作的障礙，更深刻掌握了異國文化中的邏輯思維與敘事方式，對學術與日常表達都有極大助益。

課外生活學習中，郵局與滑雪場打工是絕佳體驗。郵局內勤能磨練日常溝通與應對，深入體驗在地職場的嚴謹與細膩；滑雪場打工則能在白雪世界中享受運動樂趣，同時與來自各地的遊客及夥伴切磋交流，全面拓展國際視野與獨立生活能力。

在課內，告別了過去單向接收的填鴨式教育，課程逼迫我必須在密集的跨文化碰撞中獨立思考、勇敢發聲。當理論與真實的日本社會連結時，我不僅學會了用宏觀的社會學視角觀察異文化，也

在高強度的日常討論中，讓外語與邏輯思維能力迎來了爆發性的成長。

而課外生活則是另一堂更具挑戰的實作課。透過在郵局與滑雪場的打工，我得以第一手摸索日本職場的嚴謹紀律與細膩應對，並在白雪皚皚的環境中，與來自全球的夥伴、遊客切磋交流。獨自處理租屋、簽證與工作的突發狀況，不僅極大化地鍛鍊了我的危機處理能力，也讓我在面對未知時變得更加從容與自信。

給未來學弟妹的建議：

1. 大膽選擇「高互動性」課程：不要因為怕丟臉而只選大班制講座。多挑戰需要上台簡報、參與討論或實地考察的科目，那才是外語與思維進步最快的地方。
2. 走入在地職場，累積「非日常」體驗：課餘時間嘗試尋找當地的工讀機會，不論是嚴謹的行政或活潑的服務業，都是最快融入當地社會、理解異國文化底蘊的捷徑，這對未來規劃海外職涯將是無可取代的養分。

Academically, transitioning away from passive learning was both challenging and refreshing. The most inspiring and ultimately rewarding experience came from the specialized course, Writing. Rather than being a simple grammar or vocabulary class, it served as a high-intensity crucible for logical expression. This course forced me to externalize abstract thoughts and construct persuasive arguments with academic precision. Through continuous drafting, rigorous peer reviews, and detailed feedback from the professor, I did not just overcome language barriers; I truly learned to think within the local cultural mindset and narrative logic. Mastering the structure and nuance required by Writing significantly elevated both my scholarly output and my everyday communication

confidence, proving that clarity is the key to meaningful expression.

Beyond the classroom, life offered an equally valuable practical education. Working in two drastically different environments—a traditional Japanese post office and a vibrant ski resort—provided first-hand insight into the diverse core values and operational styles of local society. My time at the post office immersed me in an administrative setting that demanded meticulous attention to detail, strict punctuality, and polite professional correspondence. Every interaction with colleagues and customers was a lesson in Japanese business etiquette and organizational discipline, sharpening my administrative precision. Conversely, the job at the ski resort allowed me to thrive in a high-energy, international atmosphere. Handling daily customer service required rapid, effective communication with visitors and colleagues from all over the world. Navigating these two contrasting work cultures—one deeply traditional and precise, the other dynamic and globally oriented—while managing independent living responsibilities like housing and finance greatly enhanced my crisis-management abilities, cultural adaptability, and self-reliance.

My Advice for Future Students:

First, embrace interactive, output-driven classes like Writing. Do not shy away from courses that require heavy writing, active presentations, or constant verbal contribution out of fear of making mistakes. These challenging, high-pressure environments are precisely where your language proficiency, analytical skills, and cognitive depth will grow the most. The initial struggle is an integral and necessary part of your development.

Second, proactively dive into the local workforce. Secure unique part-time jobs across different sectors of society. Whether it is a traditional institutional environment like a post office or a seasonal, global environment like a ski resort, immersion in the actual working world is the ultimate shortcut to understanding a country's cultural fabric. These real-world experiences build an irreplaceable foundation for any future international career, providing lessons in cultural nuance and professional adaptability that no textbook can ever replicate.
